


"LIVING WALL" at the SSF

+Fr. Budimir Sokolovic - St. Budimir of Dobrun

More than a miracle' follows son's decades of grief Retired priest from Parma to see father named saint

-- Do you believe in miracles? The Rev. Vasilije Sokolovic does. And more.

The retired priest from St. Sava Serbian Orthodox Cathedral in Parma will say his final prayers this morning for the father he barely knew in life, a parent murdered six decades ago this week by Communists who dumped his body in a shallow, unmarked grave. The atrocity took a loving dad from a small boy, and left a legacy of sadness of not knowing his father's final resting place.

But after today, Sokolovic will never again have to pray for his father. He and millions of other Orthodox faithful can pray to St. Budimir of Dobrun -- as the Rev. Budimir Sokolovic will forever be known -- to intercede with God on their behalf.

A Serbian Orthodox Church, exercising its freedom after years of oppression, today will canonize Sokolovic and 29 other martyrs of World War II in a historic service at a rebuilt monastery in Herzegovina. The Rev. Vasilije Sokolovic, who nearly died in 2000 after a heart attack left him comatose for weeks, marvels at what he considers the divine plan that has turned decades of suffering into everlasting joy. "Only God. Only God," a smiling Sokolovic said at a dinner with family and friends in a restaurant overlooking the Sava River in the Serbian capital. "Believe me, this is more than a miracle. Unbelievable."

Budimir Sokolovic was born in 1910 in the village of Tegare. His father ran a small hotel, but Budimir completed his seminary training at age 21 and became the 41st generation of priests in the family. He was the parish priest in Dobrun from 1936 until he and his family were taken to a concentration camp in 1941. They were released as refugees to Serbia a few months later, and Budimir later was the chaplain to the high command of the non-Communist Serbian resistance group known as the Cetniks.

The last memory the son has of his father is as a 6-year-old boy in 1944. The father rode on horseback into the Serbian village of Milanovac, scooped up the young Vasilije and his brother Vladimir and assured them: "You are my life."

For more than six decades after his father's murder, through his struggle to become a priest in a land that sought to wipe out his father's memory and following the heart attack that left him close to death, Sokolovic has held on to his father's words. Last week, the memories started to flow together as Sokolovic returned to his homeland, traveling through Serbia and Bosnia-Herzegovina.

When his father died, the young Sokolovic could not even mourn. His mother taught him to deny any relation to the priest for fear that he, too, would be killed by the Communist regime in Yugoslavia. The pain of denying his father publicly was almost unbearable. But on Thursday, in a free Serbia, Sokolovic led family in singing a prayer at a restaurant. He proudly celebrated his father's pending sainthood surrounded by his brother, his wife, his son and daughter, a grandchild, and relatives and friends stretching from Northeast Ohio to his homeland.

On Friday, his 67th birthday, Sokolovic dressed in his priestly attire to sing at the 16th century Tronosa Monastery, which was restored after it was burned and looted by the Nazis. Gently flowing water bordered the landscaped grounds overlooking the Drina Valley, where nuns worked quietly in the garden as children blessed themselves as they entered the building.

En route to today's service, reminders of the tragic history of the land could be found everywhere, from bombed-out buildings in Belgrade, to rows of vandalized houses across the border in Bosnia-Herzegovina abandoned by victims of the ethnic tension that still makes some areas unsafe for religious minorities. But even this is being overcome, and St. Budimir of Dobrun will play a small part today. Serbian Orthodox leaders will canonize their 30 newest saints in the restored Zitomislic Monastery, which was blown up in the Balkan wars of the 1990s. The monastery will be consecrated in the same service, as part of the region's commitment to respect and rebuild Muslim, Catholic and Orthodox holy sites.

On his own pilgrimage, Sokolovic has crossed several age-old religious and nationalist borders. Saturday, he stopped

at a cemetery in Forca in Bosnia-Herzegovina, where his grandfather and his father's brother are buried. There, with his wife, daughter and grandson at his side, he sang the hymn "May their memory be eternal." Earlier in the day, the family stopped at a cemetery near the village of Miljevin, where his father was executed. Later, Sokolovic returned to the village with his family to pray for his father, whose burial spot is unknown. "I felt so bad knowing he was a priest, and buried without priests, like an animal, thrown away."

Now he and his family can go anywhere in the world, and pray to St. Budimir, a man who today will be recognized by the Orthodoxy as having led a life so holy there is no doubt he is in heaven.

It is the closure Sokolovic has sought.

"He knows where is father is now, definitely," says Deacon Milan Medakovic of St. Sava in Parma. "He's joyful."

But Sokolovic's wife, Zorine, believes there may be more to the story.

She never met her father-in-law, but she has prayed every day of her married life for his eternal rest and care.

"I've always felt he accepted me," Zorine Sokolovic said. "Everything I heard of him was he was a loving person."

She already has begun to switch from praying for Budimir to praying to him. As she looks back, she wonders if her father-in-law already took care of them when her husband came out of his coma.

"How do I know who did the miracle?" she asks herself. "Who's to know? Was he there for us?"

Her husband is sure of it.

"Definitely," Sokolovic said. "All my life I have felt he saved me."

Sokolovic said he thinks this will be his last visit to his native land. But his soul is at peace, he said.

"When this whole thing is over, I'm not afraid to die," he said. "Whatever time God gives me, I am thankful to God for everything because I lived long enough to realize and see my father as a saint."

Uncle's brutal end haunts area priest

As a youngster growing up under communist rule in Yugoslavia, Nedeljko Grgurevich, pastor of St. Nicholas Serbian Orthodox Church in Westmont, Pennsylvania, never had a chance to mourn the brutal death of his uncle.

Nearly a half a century later, Grgurevich, 70, found himself weeping as he returned to his homeland to take part in the canonization ceremony declaring his uncle a saint i nthe Serbian Orthodox Church.

The Westmont priest, who spent three weeks in July visiting Bosnia and Serbia, said the story of his uncle, Momcilo Grgurevic, is a chilling one.

In 1941, he was a parish priest who condemned the principles of communism and its anti-Christian views that were propagated by dictator Marshal Josip Tito.

While the late priest never carried a gun or knife, he was part of a resistance movement that had a more powerful weapon: Faith.

Momcilo Grgurevich challenged the Tito regime, and became a martyr when communist forces murdered him in the streets of a mountain village in 1945.

Now, nearly 60 years later, he has been declared a saint, venerated as an intercessor of Jesus Christ and had his portrait placed on an icon, a significant achievement in the Serbian Orthodox religion.

The Yugoslav priest evaded capture by communist troops for four years. While underground resistance fighters conducted guerrilla tactics during a civil war, he waged his own battle to fan the flame of religious fervency.

He was nearly caught on several occasions, but managed to narrowly escape the fury of pursuing soldiers, who were ordered to send him to a concentration camp.

"My uncle eventually was discovered and shot and wounded in both legs," Rev. Grgurevich said in an interview at the parish house on St. Clair Road. "Reports indicate that he was dragged along the village streets and eventually decapitated by troops using a saw, despite being alive and conscious."

His head was placed in a bag and taken to a local government office and tossed down a hallway. The purpose was to disgrace him and his family and discourage others from practicing religion.

"One brave lady from his parish demanded his head and got it," Grgurevich said. "His body was picked up by other parishioners."

The communists would not allow the congregation to bury the body.

Instead, the body and head were placed in a shallow grave near a dump, where they remained until 1990.

"I remember my father tried several times to have his brother's body moved to a family cemetery that is more than 200 years old," Grgurevich said.

"Every time he placed a cross on my uncle's grave, it was removed. It wasn't until the fall of communism in 1990 that one of my uncle's sons had the body exhumed and moved to a grave next to the altar of his former church."

Momcilo Grgurevic's road to sainthood began when witnesses testified about a special light that would shine down from the heavens on his grave. Also, after all those years of being buried beneath the earth, the skin covering his skull re-

mained intact and had a yellowish cast that resembled beeswax.

"The Holy Assembly of Bishops in Belgrade, under a proposal by the Metropolitan, accepted him as a priest martyr and made him a saint of the Serbian Church," said Grgurevich, who participated in a ceremony on July 11 that officially welcomed his uncle into the communion of saints.

An icon of his uncle will be on display at the Bosnian church in Forca, the priest's hometown near Sarajevo.

July 11 has been proclaimed to a day of observance for the priest's accomplishments. The open sepulchre holding Momcilo Grgurevic's remains, which are draped with vestments, is on display near the church's alter.

The martyred priest was only 39 years old when he was murdered. He was married, but his wife died of natural causes several years before his death.

The couple's two sons who went to live with Nedeljko Grgurevich's family, both died of cancer before their father was canonized.

Grgurevich remembers his uncle as a passionate man who was a strict disciple of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

"When I first knelt down and saw his skull, I cried," said Grgurevich, who has been a priest in Johnstown since 1977. "I never had the chance to mourn him when he was killed in the mountains."

Grgurevich, his wife and son joined thousands of others who took part in a procession and canonization rite.

"The road to the small, rural church is a twisting, rough path used mostly by loggers," said Grgurevich.

"It is a difficult trip, but one that I would not have missed for the world."
